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
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FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

On My Mind

I have always had a fascination with history and of course, with Jewish history in particular. I have recently been working my

way through an excellent book; *Turning Points in Jewish History*, by Marc Rosenstein (2018). Though it has not offered any grand revelations; the general and changing trends of Jewish history are well-covered ground in many other books detailing Jewish history, it is nonetheless well-written. It serves as a fascinating and healthy reminder of how the Jewish community has, variously, been transformed by and/or adapted to outside events, and has also undergone internal revisions that have shaped its path. The Jewish community of today shows evidence of the early foundations of the Jewish people – and of the many changes that occurred along the way.

Of course, change often cannot be fully discerned as it is happening ... and even if it can be, the full significance isn't typically apparent. I once had a history professor who posited, correctly I think, that events should not be regarded as 'history' until at least 50 years have passed. Only with that long look back can we fully assess and appreciate the impact of what has occurred.

One chapter of the book has caused me to consider, not for the first time, what is a crucial, indeed, existential question for the Jews of America; Can we fully integrate into, and be fully accepted by, American society while maintaining our Jewish identity? (There are material side issues related to what constitutes an 'authentic' Jewish identity, and whether we are preserving the Jewish religion, Jewish peoplehood, Jewish 'culture" or some combination thereof, but for the sake of simplicity, I'll leave that on the sideline.)

Theodore Herzl, after observing the aftermath of 'the Dreyfus Affair' in France and then subsequently making his case for a Jewish state, essentially argued that ultimately, the nations of the world would not – indeed, could not – ever eradicate centuries-old hatred of Jews. It mattered not how civilized they were, and it was equally irrelevant what steps the Jewish population might take to 'fit in.' Antisemitism would, inevitably, remain and the Jewish population would therefore never be fully accepted nor gain true equality ... unless and until they had a Jewish state of their own.

The prevailing sentiment of many has been that America is different; that here, antisemitism could be held in check and that Jews could thrive here without significantly com-

promising open adherence to Judaism. Though not without challenges, including high rates of intermarriage and reduced synagogue affiliation, centuries of Jewish life in America has largely bore that out. Jewish identification, whether religious, ethnic, or perhaps 'cultural' has remained, the Jewish community has, by many measures, thrived, and despite it being a viable option, there are relatively low levels of aliyah from America to the State of Israel.

But antisemitism remains a wild card. In my parents' generation it was prevalent, but during much of my own lifetime, anti-Jewish sentiment was receding. In the 1990s, incidents of antisemitism were minimal, studies showed that Jews were regarded as 'desirable' marriage partners and anecdotally, a number of decidedly non-Jewish public figures were unabashedly, acknowledging Jewish strands in their background. It appeared that, at least in America, the ancient evil had been largely put into the dust bin.

And yet, in this assessment, I am reminded of a scene in a favorite movie of mine, *Excalibur* (1981) (which incidentally, had a superb cast, including a young Helen Mirren and a bit part by Patrick Stewart). King Arthur (Nigel Terry) has seemingly defeated all of his enemies, Camelot is in full splendor, and the Knights of the Round Table are enjoying the resulting peace and prosperity. He turns to Merlin (Nicole Williamson) and they have this exchange;

Arthur: Tell me, Merlin, have we defeated evil? Because it seems we have.

Merlin: Good and evil; there is never one without the other.

Arthur: Where hides evil?

Merlin: Where you least expect it. Always where you least expect it.

Alas, in recent years it has become evident that antisemitism was, at best, only lying dormant beneath the surface. It has jarred our sense of complacency, but incidents of Jewish hatred, both world-wide and here in the U.S., have soared. And so it is clear that antisemitism remains a potent force.

What will the decades ahead bring? The crystal ball offers no clarity, and the odds-makers can only speculate. Of course, all of us hope that this ugly stain can be cleansed from the fabric of American society ... but only the historians will be able to look back 50 years from now and determine if this was just a blip, or a trend that altered the flow of history.

January presents us with a chance to try new things in our lives, including making a renewed commitment to Jewish life in Olney. I invite you to make plans to spend time with your Shaare Tefila family over the next couple of months. If you have not regularly attended worship service opportunities we encourage you to do so. Join us at weekday *minyanim* (offered in person and on Zoom at 8:45am, Sundays, Mondays and Thursdays; on Zoom only at 7:30pm, Mondays and Wednesdays). If you have a school age children in your life and you have not brought them to our monthly Junior Congregation experience, I invite you to come at 11am on January 4.

The new secular year also offers the opportunity to try a Jewish ritual at home that you have not tried before. If you have not been doing the *Havdalah* ritual regularly, you can participate in the *Havdalah* ceremony with the community over Zoom, led by Rabbi Layman, each week. On January 25, we are holding our next *Havdalah* Experience program at Shaare Tefila. We always begin the event with the *Havdalah* ceremony to end *Shabbat*, and this month's program will feature a trivia game. More details will be coming soon!

We truly appreciate your ongoing generosity!



The 'YOU' in YOUR Weekly Kiddush

This is a friendly reminder to all able-bodied members of Shaare Tefila that we need your support to help with the weekly kiddush. Each week a lovely kiddush is offered after services to enable attendees to shmooze and enjoy a little something to eat. Everyone enjoys the nosh and camaraderie, but we need your help to make this happen.

I, and other dedicated volunteers, take care of the needed shopping and/or food delivery. And every Shabbat (and Jewish holiday), a 'kitchen captain' is designated; he/she knows what is to be served.

Here's where you come in. All of our many other volunteers are randomly assigned each week to set up and clean up. By sharing the work needed to make this happen, no one will feel burned out, so that help is greatly appreciated. And as a bonus, most of those who work in the kitchen find it rewarding to meet other congregants and enjoy the *heimish* experience. (The Yiddish word heimish, pronounced "haymish," means homey, warm, or unpretentious. It can also be used to describe people who are friendly and warm.)

How will you know when it is your turn to help? The weekly teams are listed in the monthly shofar and you should receive a reminder email from the captain you will working with. Plus, at the end of each listsery message, you will see the link below and can thereby easily check the listing at: https://bit.ly/ST_Kiddush

If you find you are unable to help on your assigned day, we ask that you find someone to take your place, inform your captain, and offer another day when you will be

able to help. Typically, most members are asked to help only 2-3 times throughout the year. B'nai mitzvot families are asked to serve a few additional times.

While we are on the topic of the *kiddush*, as you can imagine, feeding 50+ people each week comes at a cost. Besides the food, there are miscellaneous extras; table coverings, plates and utensils, etc., and in the absence of a sponsor, the synagogue absorbs that cost. Donations to help cover and/or even just defray that cost are always welcome and encouraged. Donations of ANY amount are appreciated, and small donations add up.

Simchas, birthdays and anniversaries of family, etc. are, of course, always good reasons to celebrate with our community, as are significant life achievements – graduations, new jobs, and retirement. But we also encourage you to think outside of the box; sponsorship can be designated for many reasons and 'themed' kiddushim could be fun ... and a means to discover others who share your interests and might also contribute. You could, for example, designate a kiddush to celebrate your favorite sports team, gather fans of a favorite television show or musical performer, or perhaps all who share your love of chocolate! Be creative and come up with your own reason to celebrate.


